ADOPT-A-PARK PROGRAM

WHAT IS THE ADPOT-A-PARK PROGRAM?

The Adopt-A-Park Program allows participants to showcase their pride in the community. Adopt-A-Park is designed to educate the public through a low-key informal program to increase citizen awareness and pride by preserving clean and safe parks for everyone. Local service organizations, youth organizations, church groups, and neighborhoods can have fun while providing this valuable community service.

Adopt-A-Park is not a substitute for the Parks and Recreation Department's responsibility to maintain parks. AAP works to protect and enhance The Town of Prescott Valley's neighborhood parks and open spaces by providing ongoing volunteer support.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS?

- * It is a great way for your group to spend quality time together and feel good about what you are doing.
- * Your organization's name will be acknowledged on a sign in the designated park.
- * You will benefit from the satisfaction of knowing that you are improving your favorite community park.
- * It will not only better the parks of Prescott Valley, but the Town of Prescott Valley as a whole.
- * It will give groups a chance to have a hands-on role in keeping their park clean and beautiful.

WHO CAN ADOPT-A-PARK?

The Adopt-A-Park Program is open to individuals, neighborhood associations, civic groups, religious organizations, service organizations, schools (school groups and teams), businesses and other community organizations throughout the Town of Prescott Valley. Individual applications will be accepted and partnered with a neighborhood, group or organization. The Parks Division will continue to provide regular maintenance, while the individuals and groups will be asked to assist with the special care of the adopted areas. A Letter of Understanding which clarifies the responsibilities of the participating individuals or groups will be signed by the individuals or by a representative of the group. Citizen ideas and suggestions about park area improvement are appreciated and encouraged.

WHAT KIND OF COMMITMENT MUST BE MADE?

We ask for a commitment to conduct a group cleanup at least once a month for a minimum of 2 hours. Each group is also required to set up monthly work dates at the beginning of their adoption through the end of the year. Reporting forms are provided to each group to make it easy to notify us of any needed repairs or unsafe conditions. If reporting forms are not received on a regular basis, the group will be contacted and asked to renew their commitment or let another group adopt the site. Reporting forms help us ensure that each adopted site is attended to on a regular basis, which is the purpose of the program.

DUTIES:

The primary purpose of this program is to enhance maintenance and beautification efforts within a park in order to create an unpolluted park environment for all to enjoy.

Tasks may include trash pickup, graffiti reporting, weeding/raking playgrounds, sweeping shelters, cleaning picnic tables, reporting vandalism, and some use of power tools. Adopters can also help with special projects, such as graffiti removal/cover-up, painting projects and planting native plants. Some projects and tasks are not available year-round and may be available only at specific parks. Planting trees and shrubs, painting, and carpentry projects are additional tasks, which will require coordination with AAP. AAP will provide trash bags and the necessary tools, equipment, and materials when requested and deemed necessary and available.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE PARKS & RECREATION DEPARTMENT:

- * Determine site to be adopted
- * Erect a sign at the adopted park which displays the name of the group
- * Supply the group/organization with garbage bags and reporting forms (tools/equipment when requested)
- * Remove filled garbage bags from the area as soon as practical
- * Provide instruction and supervision as required for special projects
